

The Department of the Environment, Community & Local Government Homelessness Report April 2016

The Government's Homelessness Policy Statement was published in February 2013. The Statement makes explicit the Government's commitment to a housing-led approach to end long-term homelessness. There have been significant increases in rates of homelessness in recent times. The root cause of increased homelessness is the supply shortage across the housing sector, which in turn is a result of the recent economic collapse and the associated damage to the construction sector.

The long-term solution to the current homeless issue is to increase the supply of homes; in this regard the Social Housing Strategy sets out to provide 35,000 new social housing units and a further 75,000 units of long-term accommodation to meet housing needs through local authority housing supports schemes by 2020. While housing supply picks up, and units are awaited for social housing purposes at the scale envisioned under the Social Housing Strategy, a range of measures are being taken to secure a ring-fenced supply of accommodation for homeless households and to mobilise the necessary supports. These measures have been identified in the Government's Implementation Plan on the State's Response to Homelessness. This Plan represents a whole-of-Government approach to dealing with homelessness to the end of 2016 and the implementation of measures is being overseen by a group of senior officials drawn from key State agencies dealing with homelessness and the associated issues of housing, welfare, healthcare, etc. This Plan and progress reports are available on the Department's website: http://www.environ.ie/housing/homelessness/policy/homelessness


PEA - Private Emergency Accommodation: this may include hotels, B&Bs and other residential facilities that are used on an emergency basis
