WESTERN FISHERIES REGION - LOUGH CORRIB AND LOUGH MASK (TROUT ANGLING) BYE-LAW NO. C.S. 270, 2000

I, FRANK FAHEY, Minister for the Marine and Natural Resources, in exercise of the powers conferred on me by section 9 (as amended by section 3 of the Fisheries (Amendment) Act, 1962 (No 31 of 1962), and section 50 of the Fisheries Act, 1980 (No. 1 of 1980)) of the Fisheries (Consolidation) Act, 1959 (No. 14 of 1959) and the Fisheries (Transfer of Departmental Administration and Ministerial Functions) Order, 1977 (S.I. No. 30 of 1977) (as adapted by the Marine (Alteration of Name of Department and Title of Minister) Order, 1997 (S.I. No. 301 of 1997)), hereby make the following Bye-law:

- 1. This Bye-law may be cited as the Western Fisheries Region Lough Corrib and Lough Mask (Trout Angling) Bye-Law No. C.Ş. 270, 2000.
- 2. This Bye-law shall come into operation on the led day of Upril , 2000.
- 3. Notwithstanding anything contained in any Bye-law fixing the annual close season for angling in the waters of Lough Corrib and Lough Mask, a person shall not angle for trout with rod and line in the said waters, during the period commencing on 1 October in any year and ending on 14 February in the following year.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This is not part of the Bye-law and does not purport to be a legal interpretation).

This Bye-law provides that the annual close season for angling for trout in the waters of Lough Corrib and Lough Mask shall be extended from 31st January to the end of the 14th day of February i.e. the close season will commence on the 1st October and end on the 14th February the following year.

FOOTNOTE

Section 11 of the Fisheries (Consolidation) Act, 1959 as amended by Section 27 (b) of the Fisheries (Amendment) Act, 1999 provides that any person aggrieved by this Bye-law may within 28 days after its publication in the Iris Oifigiuil, appeal against same to the High Court.
