They also need to be in line with other EU Legislation on Air and Water pollution. To meet these legal obligations a massive shift in agriculture is needed in Ireland. I would like the CAP to deliver the following;

- CAP payments should be phased out for beef, dairy and sheep production.
- -Farmers should be allowed to keep their CAP payment if they return their land back to native ecosystems (native woodland, wetlands, grasslands). Farmers can submit an ecosystem restoration plan showing how they will support the return to native ecosystems in some cases land will recover itself.

hedgerows, began to reinstate lost hedgerows and planted a native tree nursery


on the family farm again in line with the EU Habitat Directives.

As the government is finalising plans on how it will spend nearly €10 billion in public money over the rest of this decade, I hope that you will listen to small farmers and communities who want to see the land farmed and or rehabilitated and preserved in a better way.

This is an extremely necessary opportunity for rewilding.

It is well documented and publicly disseminated idea amongst conservationist and scientific communities that rewilding be included in the options for farmers who are in receipt of CAP payments.

As the pandemic and it's complete moratorium on human activity demonstrated during 2020, Rewilding of habitats and allowing nature its rightful and necessary place in the world is the most effective way to restore biodiversity and mitigate this evolving climate crisis. It is particularly needed for restoration of peatlands, river flood plains and native forests and farmers should be paid for this. The preservation of these natural resources through innovative re wilding programs can be transform these devastated landscapes into our greatest assets in terms of carbon sequestration and green House gas absorption. We must make th rewilding of habitats the financially viable option for farmers in the custodianship of the planet taking farmers out of the hot seat as those contributing to the crisis and placing them at the helm of transforming, reforming and rehabilitating our most significant natural asset.

Farmers are custodians as are rural communities and the CAP reformed correctly can empower communities to make positive change in a supported, unified response to mitigate the crisis we all face and find a common and unified solution.

Ireland declared a Climate Emergency in 2019, yet we have seen no evidence in our community that the CLIMATE AND BIODIVERSITY EMERGENCY is being treated as such.

The benefits of such a policy would be enormous for wildlife, for the climate, for rural communities, and above all, for farmers themselves. Rewilding can possibly speak also to the landowners in this country with sub plots of smaller holdings who are not necessarily farmers, Facilitating them as providers of essential ecosystems through the creation of essential habitats and carbon sequestration pockets is all within the realms of this essential reform. Further to this, I think that the role of artists as illuminators in this essential

paradigm shift needs to be acknowledged and utilised. Visual and contemporary art which collaborates with communities in the transition and implementation of a new and reformed CAP has the potential to create employment and opportunity not just within the farming and natural heritage sectors but also in the arts and cultural sectors of communities. The provision for rewilding programs can show the immense and expansive benefits of nurturing our nature as something which at the centre of our society can not only rehabiltate the natural biological ecosystem but also support a healthy financial and socio economic ecosystem where people as well as nature thrive. Artists_ are the catalyst often to such pereception shift.

I hope that rewilding can be placed at the very centre of any CAP reform, as we move into positive climate action across the island of Ireland.

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Dear Minister,

Farming exists due to mans intimate relationship with nature. We learned what plants to eat, how to grow them from seed, what animals could feed us and how to keep and breed them to suit our growth and development. We used the fertile soils to grow our crops and used its pristine waters for drinking, irrigation and transport.

Nature has provided for us for thousands of years but our continued expansion and exploitation of our natural resources has pushed wildlife into the smallest pockets of land and sea. The vast majority of land in Ireland is farmed. Driving from one side of the country to the other it is hard to pass anything other than farmed fields.

The more we push nature and wildlife away the more poor our land and water will become. Our short term push for production will lead to along term collapse of soil fertility, pollinator populations and water quality, all essential for sustainable food productions.

Giving farmers the opportunity to be paid to allow some of our land back to nature is an easy solution that is available to us. In the book Wilding, Isabella Tree describes beyond doubt the benefits of rewilding for nature and for people. In the year 2000 Isabella and her husband changed the use of their 3500 acre farm at Knepp, Sussex from intensive farming to wild landscape, introducing some large grazers in the process.

The results have been exceptional

and 20 years later Knepp is home to a huge variety of flora and fauna including many of Britains rarest birds and animals.

Please include rewilding as an option to farmers as a part of the new CAP strategy and secure a healthy future for both wildlife and farming alike.

Department of Agriculture, Food and the Marine in respect of the consultation on the environmental assessment of the Common Agricultural Policy.

Clare PPN (CPPN) is a network of 331 community, voluntary, environmental and social inclusion groups from Clare. It exists to facilitate the formal participation by the community sector in Clare County Council's policy making structures and to support communication and information sharing in the community and voluntary sector in Clare. It is funded jointly by the Department of Rural and Community Development and Clare County Council but is autonomous and its activities are directed by its members through an elected secretariat. Clare Public Participation Network welcomes the public consultation on the Environmental Assessment of the Common Agricultural Policy. This submission is made on behalf of Clare PPN's environmental college members and is based on our ongoing work and consultations with them.

We wish to raise the following issues which relate to the protection of biodiversity, climate change, sustainable rural livelihoods, protection of water catchments, and securing a just transition:

- CAP as administered in Ireland needs to develop and enhance horticulture and smallholding. 70% of the world's food is produced by small farmers and the reversal of intensification can bring huge benefits and promote local food security.
- 2. Clare PPN considers that a change in EU and national policy which steers farming towards food security and food sovereignty and away from a profit motive is necessary. Clare PPN considers that the investments currently made in making the for profit systems financially viable should in the face of the climate crisis be reoriented towards making food systems sustainable, climate neutral and regenerative. Our member groups consider that this transition can and should be progressed whilst sustaining the incomes of famers.
- 3. Clare PPN considers that there is a need for supported funded systems to ensure sufficient new farmers enter the vocation. Our consultations with the

farming community have identified this as an issue. Our skills base for food production needs to be replenished and routes other than the traditional familial transfer of land need to be established so that people can enter the profession as a choice rather than only as an inheritance. Community of commonly held land options as well as establishing a system for the long term leasing of land should be considered and resources as an environmental action.

- 4. Clare PPN recommends an expansion of 'farming with nature schemes' an expansion of organic farming schemes and the promotion and support for locally produced food.
- 5. Clare PPN recommends significant supports be introduced for 're-wilding' of supposed non-productive land rather than the traditional drainage, planting or reclamation of same.
- 6. Clare PPN recommends that schemes to encourage tree planting are redesigned so that they facilitate mixed planting and agricultural usage of land which can assist soil quality, shelter, prevent erosion and provide carbon sequestration.
- 7. Clare PPN recommends a re-balancing of 'input' based farming where intensive nitrates and fertilizer usage is required to sustain farming incomes. As these inputs increase in price it will become more logical to promote and sustain methods of farming which do not require them.
- 8. Clare PPN notes that water and river catchment pollution is concentrated in areas of heaviest dairy farming. We consider this unsustainable and that a recalibration of farming methods and intensity is necessary. Clare PPN strongly supports the protection of rural and farmers income during the necessary transitions.
