RIVER DARGLE (ANGLING) BYE-LAW NO. 763, 2000.

I, Frank Fahey, Minister for the Marine and Natural Resources, in exercise of the powers conferred on me by section 9 (as amended by section 3 of the Fisheries (Amendment) Act, 1962 (No 31 of 1962), section 50 of the Fisheries Act, 1980 (No. 1 of 1980)), of the Fisheries (Consolidation) Act, 1959 (No. 14 of 1959), section 33 of the Fisheries (Amendment) Act, 1962, and the Fisheries (Transfer of Departmental Administration and Ministerial Functions) Order, 1977 (S.I. No. 30 of 1977) (as adapted by the Marine (Alteration of Name of Department and Title of Minister) Order, 1997 (S.I. No. 301 of 1997)), hereby make the following Bye-law:

1. This Bye-law may be cited as the River Dargle (Angling) Bye-law No. 763, 2000.
2. This Bye-law shall come into operation on 1 July, 2000.
3. It is hereby prohibited -
 - (a) to use or attempt to use any lure other than artificial fly in angling for any kind of fish with rod and line in the stretch of the River Dargle in the county of Wicklow between Bray Bridge and the mouth of the Old Court River, known locally as the Swan River, or
 - (b) to have in possession on any quay on or adjacent to, or on or near the banks of the aforesaid stretch of river, any mounted rod to which is attached any lure other than artificial fly.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This note is not part of the Bye-law and does not purport to be a legal interpretation).

This Bye-law prohibits angling with any lure other than artificial fly in the stretch of the River Dargle in the county of Wicklow between Bray Bridge and the mouth of the Old Court River, known locally as the Swan River.

FOOTNOTE

Section 11 of the Fisheries (Consolidation) Act, 1959 provides that any person aggrieved by this Bye-law may within 28 days after its publication in the Iris Oifigiúil, appeal against same to the High Court.
