

FISHERIES-IRELAND.

32 & 33 Vic., c. 92, and the Acts incorporated therewith.

BYE-LAW: DONEGAL BAY

WHEREAS by a Bye-Law, bearing date the Twenty-fourth day of February, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Sixty, the USE of Nets for the capture of Fish of any kind, with Meshes of less than One Inch from knot to knot (to be measured along the side of the square, or Four Inches to be measured all round each such Mesh, such measurements being taken in the clear when the Net is wet), was thereby prohibited on that part of the Coast of the County of Donegal inside or to the North-east and North of Lines drawn from Rossan Point to Teelin Head, and from Teelin Head to Carrigan Head, and from Carrigan Head to Muckross Point, all in the Barony of Bannagh, and County of Donegal.

NOW, in pursuance of the powers and authorities in Us vested by the "Fisheries (Ireland) Act, 1869," We do hereby repeal and rescind the above recited Bye-Law, and the same is hereby repealed and rescinded accordingly.
