



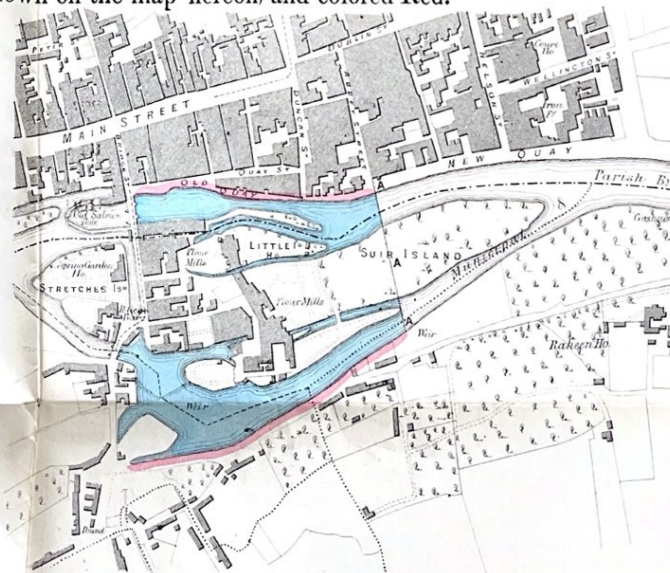

RIVER SUIR.

BYE-LAW.

WE, the Inspectors of Irish Fisheries, acting under the powers and authorities given to us, do make and ordain this Bye-Law, by which it is prohibited, and it is hereby prohibited to use all descriptions of Engines for the capture of Fish, (save Single-Rods and Lines as hereinafter mentioned) in that part of the River Suir, between the Bridges at Suir Island and around the Shores of said Island, and the line marked A A A drawn due south across the river, and intersecting Suir Island, at Clonmel, in the Counties of Tipperary and Waterford, as more particularly shewn on the Map hereon, and colored Blue : save and except so far as regards Single Rods and lines which are permitted to be used as heretofore along the Banks of said River, as shown on the map hereon, and colored Red.



Any person offending against this Bye-Law, shall forfeit and pay for each offence a sum of FOUR POUNDS, and every such Engine used contrary to this Bye-Law, shall be forfeited.
