BYE-LAW.

WHEREAS, on the application of certain persons interested in the Oyster Fisheries in the River Shannon, and in the Bays and Inlets thereof, the Inspectors of Irish Fisheries did, on the 28th day of April and 1st day of May, 1875, call Meetings of the persons possessed of, or interested in such Oyster Fisheries, after giving Notice of such Meetings in the manner prescribed by the Statute in that case made and provided, and did at such Meetings hear and receive all such pertinent evidence as was offered to them on the subject of said Fisheries, and did examine and enquire into the same on Oath. Now in pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in us in such case, We, the said Inspectors of Irish Fisheries, do hereby decide upon, fix, and appoint the term of Two Years from the date hereof, within which it shall not be lawful to dredge for, take, catch, or destroy, by any means whatsoever, any Oyster or Oyster Brood in that part of the River Shannon commonly called and known by the name of Poulnasherry Bay, within or to the northward of a line drawn from Baurnahard Point to Querrin Point, all in the County of Clare. And any person offending against this Bye-Law shall for each offence forfeit and pay a sum of TWO POUNDS.
