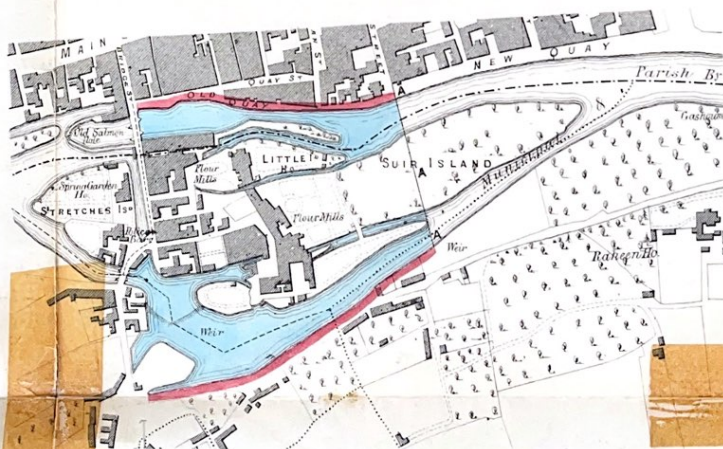

BYE-LAW.

WHEREAS, by a Bye-Law, bearing date the 17th day of April, 1874, the use of all descriptions of Engines for the Capture of Fish, (save Single-rods and Lines,) was prohibited in a certain part of the River Suir as therein mentioned. Now we, the Inspectors of Irish Fisheries in pursuance of the powers and authorities in us vested by the Fisheries' (Ireland) Act, 1869, do hereby repeal and rescind the above mentioned Bye-Law, and the same is repealed and rescinded accordingly; and in lieu thereof, we do make and substitute the following Bye-Law, that is to say:—The use of all descriptions of Engines for the capture of Fish, (save Single-Rods and Lines as hereinafter mentioned) is hereby prohibited in that part of the River Suir between the Bridges at Suir Island and around the Shores of said Island, and the line marked A A A drawn due south across the river, and intersecting Suir Island, at Clonmel, in the Counties of Tipperary and Waterford, as more particularly shewn on the Map hereon, and colored Blue; save and except so far as regards Single Rods and Lines which are permitted to be used as heretofore by persons fishing from the Banks of said River, as shown on the Map hereon, and colored Red.



Any person offending against this Bye-Law, shall forfeit and pay for each offence a sum of **FOUR POUNDS**, and every such Engine used contrary to this Bye-Law, shall be forfeited.
