INTRODUCTION

The Project Woodland Board is pleased to present its latest Interim Report covering the continued implementation of Project Woodland up to August 2022. The purposes are to (1) provide the Board's feedback across the scope of Project Woodland, (2) ensure Working Groups and stakeholders are apprised of developments, and (3) inform and make recommendations to the Minister on next steps.

The Project Board gratefully acknowledges all feedback received on its previous reports and submissions/recommendations from Working Groups. The Project board evaluates recommendations and priorities for implementation based on anticipated benefit having regard to the scale of work involved and getting best use of resources available.

SUMMARY ACHIEVEMENTS & PROGRESS

There has been continued, notable progress on the implementation of Project Woodland summarised below:


- Significant progress has been made in reducing the backlog with a reduction from the start of 2022 of 3,700 applications on hand > 120 days to 1,875 as of 2nd September 2022. However, afforestation licensing remains behind target and further additional work to address recent blockages is underway. The Board notes the substantial increase in ecology resources, process improvements and training expected to yield significantly increased output in the coming months. Progress is also noted on greater transparency on license application status for applicants.
- The **Environment Report Grant (ERG)** has been sanctioned by DPER and payments commenced at Form 2 stage on July 12th with 61 payments paid to date.
- Following a successful pilot, DAFM is finalising SOPs for a nationwide rollout of the **Pre-Application Discussion (PAD)** to improve the accuracy and efficiency of processing applications.
- The Independent Regulatory Review for Afforestation, Roads & Felling has been concluded and has been considered by the Project Board in discussion with the relevant WGs. The review was unable to identify a single or straightforward solution, however it offers a suite of options that have the potential to simplify the process and to bring greater certainty as regards likely timing and conditions of licensing application outcomes. The report is currently being evaluated and an action plan responding to the recommendations is being drawn up by DAFM.
- DAFM has compiled a report on the **Shared National Vision for Forestry 2050** following extensive public consultation through a Citizens Deliberative Dialogue, Public

- Attitudes Survey, Irish Rural Link questionnaires, a Youth Forum, an Online Survey and Bilateral Consultations with key stakeholders.
- Work is well advanced on the **Forestry Strategy** to deliver the vision, as one of the principal outputs/objectives from the original Mackinnon recommendations with publication due in Q3.
- ARUP will conduct the **SEA/AA** for the Implementation Plan and Forest Strategy as required before final publication. Work has commenced on the technical elements.
- Responses to the Organisation Review tender received and DAFM will evaluate and select a suitable applicant with an outline estimate of 3 months to complete. This will have regard to possible learnings from the Legal & Regulatory review.
- Training Needs Analysis commenced by Auxilia consultants and will run for 9 weeks.
- First draft of the **Customer Charter** completed and will take inputs from WG4 on timelines in developing the appropriate response times for license applications.
- Significant work has commenced on implementation of the Communications Plan
 with conferences/workshops held at Oakpark April 13th and in Athlone May 11th to
 enable better communications and promotion initiatives with cross-industry stakeholders including DAFM, Teagasc, COFORD, Coillte, IFA, Irish Forest Owners, GAA,
 ITGA, WFC, SWS, The Acorn Project and other members from the workgroups.
- The on-going **Business Systems and Process** review is working closely with the Agile Implementation Group to implement new process and systems improvements with 12 items completed and a further 10 in progress.
- Project Woodland is now entering its final stage and planning has commenced for the implementation of a new forest strategy and forestry programme to include structures needed to support this implementation. Making our shared national vision a reality will require multi-stakeholder support and collaboration building on the achievements to date through Project Woodland.
- We are therefore entering a period of transition as we move from the specific objectives of Project Woodland to the implementation of an ambitious shared vision for the role of trees, woods and forests in Ireland's future.

LICENSING OUTPUTS

Progress continues in reducing the **Backlog of licensing applications**. Further modernisation of the processes around iNET/iFORIS is taking place and the AA Assist software has been successfully implemented for afforestation applications. The number of Licences on hand > 120 days continues to decline and is down from 3,700 at the start of 2022 to 1,875. The downward trend is illustrated below. Good progress is evident in most categories achieving 94% of target against plan, with the exception of Afforestation Licensing which remains behind target in H1, 2022. The Project Board has asked for greater focus on afforestation to address remaining blockages, noting the increased resources in that area to deliver substantially more output in Q3.

The Board monitors outputs across felling, forest roads and afforestation and DAFM continues to invest in resources which has had a positive impact. DAFM has committed to providing a quarterly update indicating progress to provide clarity on the Licensing Plan and to allow monitoring of the key performance indicators. PROJECT STATUS

The following tables indicate the summary status and outstanding items to be completed by the year end for this phase of Project Woodland. Using a rating system of 1-5 to indicate progress to date on meeting the objectives & outputs, the project is approximately 70% complete. A significant number of key tasks and objectives are close to finishing to meet the original recommendations outlined in the Mackinnon report. By necessity, some items will transfer into the new forestry strategy and programme in 2023. The Project Board will make recommendations on the transition to the new Forestry Programme 2023 and the appropriate implementation strategy.
