Summary

Our Rural Future 2021-2025 is the Government's national rural development policy, and provides a blueprint for sustainable development of, and investment in, rural Ireland over its five-year lifespan.

The policy contains a range of measures for implementation across Government throughout this period – these measures are being achieved through the delivery of actions set out in annual work programmes and monitored through the publication of twice yearly progress reports.

All progress reports and work programmes are published on the Department of Rural and Community Development's <u>Our Rural Future website</u>.

This Fourth Progress Report covers activity which has taken place in Quarter 1 and Quarter 2 of 2023, and reflects the progress made towards the delivery of actions set out in the 2023 Work Programme.

The Fourth Progress Report contains updates on 96 actions in the 2023 Work Programme, with contributions from 16 departments or agencies.

Of these, 10 actions were of an ongoing nature. Of the remaining 86, a total of 51 were completed, with the remaining 35 delayed, a completion percentage of 60%.

This includes the completion of 13 actions that were delayed in 2022 and brought forward for completion in the first half of 2023.

Optimising Digital Connectivity

Measure 1

Invest up to €2.7 billion in the roll-out of the National Broadband Plan and explore how the initiative can be accelerated to deliver connectivity as soon as possible in rural areas.

Lead Delivery Body: National Broadband Ireland, under contract to DECC

1.1	Continue roll-out of the National Broadband Plan, with construction continuing in all counties.	Ongoing

Update: As of 14 July 2023, more than 162,600 premises have been passed across all counties since the start of the plan, meaning they are able to avail of a connection to high-speed broadband. In addition, more than 177,400 premises across all counties can order or pre-order service. There have been more than 46,500 premises connected, with a further 5,391 premises pending connection.

The focus is to continue to build momentum in the build programme, catching up on the delays experienced. NBI committed to delivering a cumulative target of 185,000 premises passed by the end of January 2024, but due to the positive pace of the roll-out, the forecast for the end of 2023 is due to be exceeded, with more than 190,000 premises passed by mid-December 2023.

Update: The Work Life Balance and Miscellaneous Provisions Act 2023 has been enacted. Parts 1 and 2 of the Act together with other provisions have now been commenced. Part 3 of the Act provides for a right to request remote working and DETE are leading work on the development of the Code of Practice on this. The Workplace Relations Commission recently held a public consultation on the code of practice, which was receiving submissions up until 9 June. Part 3 of the Act will be commenced by the Minister for Enterprise, Trade and Employment as soon as is practicable following the completion of this Code.

Measure 8

Develop national data on the incidence and frequency of remote work, to provide an evidence base for future policy.

Update: Published figures for Q1 2023 show that a total of 891,000 workers either 'usually' or 'sometimes' work from home. While this is a slight reduction of just over 50,000 on the same quarter in 2022, it still reflects a 75 per cent, or 384,000, increase on Q4 2019, the last full quarter before the Covid pandemic.

Measure 10

Mandate public sector employers, colleges, and other public bodies to move to 20% home and remote working in 2021, with further annual increases over the lifetime of this policy.

Update: The seven-year Public Service Transformation Strategy (to 2030), 'Better Public Services' was launched in May 2023. The strategy is framed around three core themes:

- Digital and Innovation at Scale
- Workforce and Organisation of the Future
- Evidence-informed policy and services designed for and with our public

Under the 'Digital and Innovation at Scale' theme, there is a commitment that the Public Service will collaborate on projects to provide dynamic and agile workplaces by creating environments that support a culture of innovation and continue to respond to the needs of citizens and customers.

As part of the strategy, Public Service Bodies are asked to develop scalable innovations and create dynamic workspaces to replicate successful approaches and support the right environment for innovation and customer focus.

Measure 14

Provide grants to retail businesses in rural towns and villages to establish an online presence to complement traditional footfall trade.

Update: A new round of the Online Retail Scheme with a budget of €3.4 million closed for applications on 3 May 2023. The assessment process is ongoing.

All counties with the exception of Co. Leitrim submitted an application. Dublin has 20% of the applications under assessment with the remaining 80% from other counties outside of Dublin.

In 2022, the COVID-19 Online Retail Scheme (ORS) underwent an economic evaluation as part of a programme of expenditure reviews carried out by DPER.

The Review found that the ORS assisted the retail sector by providing the necessary credit required to build and develop digital capabilities to become more productive and competitive. It also found it is critical to continue to fund the ORS, as the retail sector needs to be equipped with digital tools so it can retain and expand its customer base.

Measure 16

Expand the provision of free-to-use wireless internet connectivity in rural areas through the rollout of Broadband Connection Points and other initiatives such as the WiFi4EU public wi-fi networks and the Digital Innovation Programme.

Update: There are 290 of the 300 BCPs now declared live with a number of sites nearing completion. There are a small number of sites that have additional technical complexities and it is expected that the full network will be connected in the coming months.

Update: DRCD has provided total funding of approximately €1.2 million to support this initiative, through co-funding of up to €15,000 for each voucher secured by local authorities, effectively doubling the value of the investment. The programme is now complete and 1,201 hotspots are 'live' across 27 local authority areas.

Update: €145 million has been secured for regional enterprise funding to 2027 from the European Regional Development Fund (ERDF) to support projects aligned to the Regional Enterprise Plans.

Enterprise Ireland, which designs and administers regional enterprise funding schemes on behalf of DETE, has been engaging with the Managing Authorities and European Commission to secure the appropriate sanctions in order to launch the first call under the proposed 'Smart Regional Enterprise Innovation Scheme'. These discussions are at an advanced stage and the aim is to launch the first call under the Scheme by the end of 2023.

Measure 23

Deliver ambitious job creation and enterprise development targets for the indigenous sector in the strategies of Enterprise Ireland, Údarás na Gaeltachta and the Local Enterprise Offices to embed jobs growth more deeply within the regions.

Update: A Connected Hubs strategy, setting out Connected Hubs platform priorities and actions to ensure the continued development of the Connected Hubs ecosystem from 2023-2025, will be finalised shortly. The strategy focuses on the key areas/pillars of Research and Sustainability, Technology, Hub Community Ecosystem, and Marketing, Promotion and Awareness. It will also include an action plan which will be open to review in response to the rapidly changing nature of the sector and, in particular, in response to the publication of the forthcoming National Hubs Strategy.

Maximise our resources and strengths in the Green Economy to support employment opportunities for rural communities in areas such as renewable energy, sustainable tourism, energy retrofitting, the Bioeconomy and the Circular Economy.

This report was published in March 2023 and is now informing the development of the National Cluster Programme and considerations around the establishment of the national coordination mechanism.

Update: Following completion of the work referred to in 28.3 above, work is underway to develop the National Cluster Programme which is due in Q3 2023. DETE is engaging with a range of stakeholders to ensure the Programme is tailored effectively to support and enhance the Irish clustering ecosystem. The Programme will identify a central coordinating function with responsibility for implementing a national clustering approach and implementation will commence in Q4 2023.

Update: Údarás na Gaeltachta has launched two social enterprise funding supports for 2023 as part of its Gaeltacht Social Enterprise Strategy. The primary social enterprise support scheme is funded by Údarás to assist the development of new or existing social enterprises. The second is a Social Enterprise Concept Development Scheme, funded by DRCD, with a budget of €5,000 per funded application, aimed at enabling potential social enterprises to

develop a concept and business plan. Both schemes opened for applications in March 2023, and applications are being assessed on an ongoing basis.

30.4 Launch a new hybrid social finance pilot which will allow social enterprises to build capacity and provide them with more financial flexibility by reducing their reliance on grant funding.

Update: The Hybrid Social Finance Loan 2023-2024 was launched in March 2023 as a partnership between Rethink Ireland, Community Finance Ireland and DRCD via the Dormant Accounts Fund, following on from research undertaken in partnership with DCU. The scheme aims to build the capacity of start-up social enterprises that are first-time borrowers.

Measure 32

Further develop the Wild Atlantic Way (WAW), Ireland's Hidden Heartlands (IHH), and Ireland's Ancient East (IAE) as regional tourism offerings and further diversify tourism opportunities by strengthening Ireland's image as an outdoor activity holiday destination to the domestic and international markets.

Update: Fáilte Ireland launched its four new Regional Tourism Development Strategies 2023-2027 in May 2023. These strategies provide a framework for sustainable tourism development across Fáilte Ireland's regional brands.

The Regional Tourism Development Strategies will be activated across each region through a series of local area action plans, referred to as Destination and Experience Development Plans. Fáilte Ireland's commitment is for every part of the country to have a detailed tourism development action plan created in partnership with local stakeholders.

Publish and implement a new National Outdoor Recreation Strategy, through Comhairle na Tuaithe, to support access to, and responsible use of, outdoor recreational and leisure facilities for people of all ages, and increase employment opportunities in rural areas.

Update: A third round of URDF funding support in the sum of €150m was announced by Government and launched on 11 July 2023. Call 3 is consistent with the objectives of the National Development Plan, Housing for All, the Town Centre First Policy and the Vacant Homes Action Plan, in terms of accelerating new supply and tackling long-term vacancy. The Call 3 funding will be used by local authorities for the acquisition of long-term vacant and derelict buildings and sites in URDF towns/cities, for onward sale on the open market to purchasers who undertake to return the properties to use within timelines agreed with the local authority. It will also support the CPO activation programme being advanced by the Vacant Homes Unit within DHLGH.

The first six plans have been completed with a further 20 expected to be complete by end November 2023.

Update: This action has been reviewed by DHLGH, in conjunction with a similar Action 4 in the Night Time Economy Taskforce – "Examine the practical implications of 'meanwhile use' for planning and other legislative codes to enable the potential for buildings to be used for Night-Time Economy activities".

Update: The Croí Cónaithe Towns Fund is supporting the refurbishment of vacant and derelict properties through the Vacant Property Refurbishment Grant and the provision of serviced sites for people to build their own homes through the Ready to Build Scheme.

From 1 May, a number of important enhancements to the Vacant Property Refurbishment Grant were introduced. The grant levels increased from €30,000 to €50,000 for vacant properties and from €50,000 to €70,000 for derelict properties. Eligibility was extended to cover houses built before 2007 and support is now available for properties intended for rental as well as owner-occupied.

Under the Ready to Build scheme, local authorities will make serviced sites in towns and villages available at a discounted rate to individual purchasers who will self-build their own home and live in it as their principal private residence. It is intended that the local authority will either supply existing sites in their control or purchase sites and make them available for development by providing services and access to the sites concerned. The level of discount available will depend on the level of servicing cost incurred by the local authority before the sale of the site but will not exceed €30,000. The amount of such discount will be reflected in the sale price of the site to the purchaser. DHLGH is currently engaging with local authorities in respect of the identification of potential sites to determine their suitability under the Ready to Build scheme.

A total of 760,534 passenger journeys were recorded on Connecting Ireland routes in 2022, of which 342,607 passenger journeys were recorded from the date implementations were introduced. Connecting Ireland services continue to see an increase in patronage, up 112% at

the end of 2022 compared to the beginning of 2019. Where Connecting Ireland services have been implemented patronage has increased 128% from the beginning of 2022 to year-end.

The Connecting Ireland 2023 Programme was launched in February 2023, and proposes a total of 69 new and enhanced services in 2023.
