Item 1: Introduction

The minutes from the sixth meeting on 8 February 2023 were agreed.

The Minister wished Sinead McSherry well in her new role as Assistant Secretary for Seafood

and the Marine in DAFM.

The Minister updated the Committee on recent events and of note in terms of Food Vision

goals since the last meeting on 8 February:

• A meeting of the Horticulture Industry Forum took place, where the challenges facing the

sector were discussed. The new draft National Strategy for Horticulture, is currently open

for public consultation.

Minister of State Heydon led Irish involvement at a major Agriculture and Climate Summit

in the US. The goal of "AIM for Climate" is to address climate change and global hunger

by bringing together partners to significantly increase investment in climate-smart

agriculture and food systems innovation.

- On the research theme, the Minister recently opened with colleagues DAFM Thematic Research Call 2023, a €20 million call for pioneering research in areas such as climate mitigation and adaptation, biodiversity and water quality, sustainable farming, animal health and welfare, social sustainability, the bioeconomy, agri-digitalisation, and safe, healthy sustainable food. A world-first scientific breakthrough that can enable the reduction of methane from the Irish cattle herd through animal genetics. The research to underpin this is a result of a €3 million project 'GREENBREED', funded by the Department.
- The second annual online survey for primary producers in the food supply chain by the
 Department's Unfair Trading Practices Enforcement Authority was announced. The
 Agricultural and Food Supply Chain Bill is currently going through the legislative process,
 which will provide for the establishment of the new Office of An Rialálaí Agraibhia, or the
 Agri Food Regulator.
- A new round of funding under the Brexit Inshore Fisheries Business Model Adjustment
 Scheme for the Inshore Fisheries Sector was announced.
- The important progress which has been made under the current Common Fisheries Policy was announced. The Commission's Communication recognises the fundamental role played by stakeholders in driving these positive changes. However, the Commissions Review of the CFP has failed to analyse and address the impacts of Brexit, which has been the most significant and enduring challenge faced by the fisheries sector for generations.

Item 2: Food Vision Environmental Working Sub-Group Update

The Food Vision Environmental Working Sub-Group is a standing item on the HLIC agenda.

The monitoring and implementation process of Food Vision is key to ensuring delivery of the strategy and a key part of implementation of mission 1 is the work of this Group.

Redmond McEvoy updated the Committee on the work of the EWSG, including data collection and work on a dashboard.
