Approval Sought

The approval of the Minister is sought to grant a foreshore Licence under Section 3 of the Foreshore Act, 1933, to DePuy (Ireland) for a period of 35 years for the continued use of an existing surface water outfall pipe to service the Company car park at Loughbeg, Ringaskiddy, County Cork, situate on attached map. *Tab 1*

Background

Construction of the original outfall formed part of consented works completed under a 10 year foreshore licence issued to Warner Lambert (Export) Ltd on 01 September 1998. Tab 2

On 27th September 2011 the approval of a previous Minister with responsibility for the foreshore function consented to a further 35 year foreshore Licence to Pfizer Ireland Pharmaceuticals for the continued use of the outfall pipe however, prior to agreeing and signing of the engrossed licence the Department was notified of a change of company ownership to DePuy (Ireland).

In accordance with the advices received from the Chief State Solicitor's Office (CSSO), DePuy (Ireland) were required to submit a new foreshore licence application which is the assessed application currently before the Minister for consideration.

DePuy (Ireland) predominately manufactures orthopaedic knee and hip replacement joints. Currently the company employs over 800 people in Cork.

Public Consultation:

A public notice concerning the application was published in Irish Examiner and Southern Star on 12th March 2016. The documents were available for inspection at Togher Garda Station, Cork City for the required period of 21 days. No submissions were received during the consultation period.

Prescribed Bodies Consultation:

Written submissions on the proposed development were received from this Department's Engineering Inspectorate, Department of Agriculture, Food and the Marine, Marine Survey Office, South West Regional Fisheries Board (now Inland Fisheries Ireland), The Marine Institute, and the Underwater Archaeology and National Parks and Wildlife Service of the Department of Arts, Heritage, Regional, Rural and Gaeltacht Affairs.

There were no objections in principle to the development.

Environmental Assessment:

EIA Screening: The proposed works are not of a class that requires a mandatory EIS under the EIA Directive. *Tab 3*

Appropriate Assessment: The project was screened for Appropriate Assessment AA as part of the Marine Licence Vetting Committee (MLVC) Report and it has been determined that there will be no significant adverse effects as a result of the proposed works on the Conservation Objectives of Cork Harbour SPA, (Site Code 004030). Tab 4

Marine Lease Vetting Committee (MLVC) assessment and report:

Given that the outfall has been in place since 1998 and that no new works are proposed it can be concluded that there will be no additional disturbance to the foreshore and no impacts on any Natura 2000 site and it is recommended that a licence be issued. See report attached at *Tab 5*.

Financial Considerations:

Lisney, who acted as this Department's valuers in this case, set a value of ibject to a fixed peppercorn annual rent of demanded) with provision for rent reviews for a 35-year lease/licence agreement.

Agreement of Applicant:

DePuy (Ireland) have agreed to be bound by the terms of the original consent, accepted the site specific conditions that will be inserted into the licence *Tab* 6 and agreed to the rent of and an annual peppercorn rent of € per annum, if demanded. *Tab* 7

Companion Consents:

Planning permission was granted on 14th November 1997 under the Local Government (Planning and Development Acts) 1963 – 1993. *Tab 8*

Recommendation:

Having regard to:

- the application for a Foreshore Licence together with accompanying documents;
- the submissions received from prescribed bodies;
- the public consultation undertaken;
- the AA screening performed;
- the EIA screening performed;
- the assessment of the proposed development by the Marine Licence Vetting Committee, and its conclusions and recommendations in this regard; and
- the consent conditions to be attached to the Foreshore Licence, if granted

it is considered that:

• as no new works are proposed, there will not be a negative impact on the marine environment and the integrity of the Natura 2000 site.

It is recommended that a foreshore licence be granted subject to the conditions recommended by the MLVC and the licence fee set out above.

Notification of Minister's Determination:

If approval is granted by the Minister, DePuy (Ireland) will be informed accordingly, an appropriate licence will issue for execution and a Notice of Determination regarding the decision (including the reasons) will be published on the Department's website.

The Notice of Determination will address:

- the outcome of the Minister's determination of the application;
- the main reasons and considerations for the Minister's determination;
- a statement that all relevant documentation on which the determination is based is available for inspection both on the website of the Department and at the Department's Wexford Office; and
- confirmation that a review procedure is available before the High Court whereby
 the substantive or procedural legality of the Minister's determination may be
 challenged, together with practical information on the review procedure.

Next steps

If approval is granted, DePuy (Ireland) will be advised and the Chief State Solicitors Office will be asked to draft the necessary licence.



LICENCE UNDER SECTION 3(2) OF FORESHORE ACT, 1933

The Minister for the Marine and Natural Resources hereby authorises Warner Lambert (Export) Ltd, Loughbeg, Ringaskiddy, Co Cork (hereinafter referred to as the "Licensee"), on payment of a once-off fee of £1000 (the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged), under section 3(2) of the Foreshore Act, 1933 (No. 12 of 1933) to discharge surface water on to the foreshore from two outfall pipes to be constructed and maintained continuously in proper working order, in accordance with the Documentation submitted (Doc. No. A4696-C-R-01-A) and Drawings Number 628730 - 000 - 10C - 33 - Issue 2 and 628730 - 000 - 10C - 34 - Issue 1 as amended in agreement with the Department of the Marine and Natural Resources, subject to the following conditions:

- 1. The Licence shall remain in force until the 31st day of August 2008 unless earlier revoked for any breach thereof.
- 2. The Licensee shall ensure that there will be no contaminants of any kind discharged to the marine environment and will, in particular, ensure that

(a) surface rainwater from the surfaced carpark will be routed through the petrol interceptor, and

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- (b) surface water (including firewater) from the grounds and buildings of the factory area will be routed through a continuous monitoring chamber before discharge free of contamination to the foreshore. In the event of contamination from spillage or firewater the monitoring system will cause the contaminated water to be diverted to the firewater retention pond.
- 3(1). Subject to subparagraph (2), the Licensee may use an area of foreshore surrounding the said outfall pipes for the purpose of constructing and maintaining in continuous proper working order the said outfall pipes and for no other purpose whatsoever.
- (2). The Licensee shall minimise disturbance to the said foreshore as much as possible during construction and maintenance and reinstate to the satisfaction of the Minister any foreshore disturbed as a result of said construction or maintenance.
- 4. The Licensee shall indemnify and keep indemnified the State and the Minister, their officers, agents and employees against all actions, loss, claims, damages, costs, expenses and demands arising in any manner whatsoever in connection with the exercise of the permission hereby granted.

Screening for EIA

SITE SYNOPSIS

SITE NAME: CORK HARBOUR SPA

SITE CODE: 004030

Cork Harbour is a large, sheltered bay system, with several river estuaries - principally those of the Rivers Lee, Douglas, Owenboy and Owennacurra. The SPA site comprises most of the main intertidal areas of Cork Harbour, including all of the North Channel, the Douglas River Estuary, inner Lough Mahon, Monkstown Creek, Lough Beg, the Owenboy River Estuary, Whitegate Bay and the Rostellan and Poulnabibe inlets.

Owing to the sheltered conditions, the intertidal flats are often muddy in character. These muds support a range of macro-invertebrates, notably Macoma balthica, Scrobicularia plana, Hydrobia ulvae, Nepthys hombergi, Nereis diversicolor and Corophium volutator. Green algae species occur on the flats, especially Ulva lactua and Enteromorpha spp. Cordgrass (Spartina spp.) has colonised the intertidal flats in places, especially where good shelter exists, such as at Rossleague and Belvelly in the North Channel. Salt marshes are scattered through the site and these provide high tide roosts for the birds. Salt marsh species present include Sea Purslane (Halimione portulacoides), Sea Aster (Aster tripolium), Thrift (Armeria maritima), Common Saltmarsh-grass (Puccinellia maritima), Sea Plantain (Plantago maritima), Laxflowered Sea-lavender (Limonium humile) and Sea Arrowgrass (Triglochin maritima). Some shallow bay water is included in the site. Cork Harbour is adjacent to a major urban centre and a major industrial centre. Rostellan Lake is a small brackish lake that is used by swans throughout the winter. The site also includes some marginal wet grassland areas used by feeding and roosting birds.

The site is a Special Protection Area (SPA) under the E.U. Birds Directive, of special conservation interest for the following species: Little Grebe, Great Crested Grebe, Cormorant, Grey Heron, Shelduck, Wigeon, Teal, Pintail, Shoveler, Red-breasted Merganser, Oystercatcher, Golden Plover, Grey Plover, Lapwing, Dunlin, Blacktailed Godwit, Bar-tailed Godwit, Curlew, Redshank, Black-headed Gull, Common Gull, Lesser Black-backed Gull and Common Tern. The site is also of special conservation interest for holding an assemblage of over 20,000 wintering waterbirds. The E.U. Birds Directive pays particular attention to wetlands and, as these form part of this SPA, the site and its associated waterbirds are of special conservation interest for Wetland & Waterbirds.

Cork Harbour is an internationally important wetland site, regularly supporting in excess of 20,000 wintering waterfowl, for which it is amongst the top five sites in the country. The two-year mean of summed annual peaks for the entire harbour complex was 55,401 for the period 1995/96 and 1996/97. Of particular note is that the site supports internationally important populations of Black-tailed Godwit (905) and Redshank (1,782) - all figures given are average winter means for the two winters 1995/96 and 1996/97. At least 18 other species have populations of

Natura 2000 considerations

The outfall is located immediately adjacent to that part of the Cork Harbour SPA (Site Code 004030) located in Loughbeg. As no works will take place within or adjacent to the the SPA there will be no loss of habitat and no habitat or species fragmentation. Similarly there will be no significant disturbance to key habitats or species. As only rainwater will be discharged, via a petrol interceptor, to the marine environment, there will be no significant impact on water quality in the SPA. There will be no significant impact on wetland habitats within the SPA and no loss of potential feeding areas for overwintering waterbirds within the SPA will occur. The integrity of the site will not be affected.

On the basis of the above it considered the proposed retention and use of the existing outfall pipe will not have a significant adverse impact on the Conservation Objectives of the Cork Harbour SPA.

Conclusions and Recommendations

Given that the outfall has been in place since 1998 and that no new works are proposed it can be concluded that there will be no additional disturbance to the foreshore and no impacts on any Natura 2000 site and it is recommended that a licence be issued.
