



## **TRADER NOTICE No. 8 of 2020**

8<sup>th</sup> October 2020

To: All importers of plant and plant produce

## Subject: Certain Restrictions on Importing *Quercus in*to Ireland's Protected Zone

Please note requirements on pre notification of Oak and limitations on imports. Ireland has a Protected Zone for *Thaumetopoea processionae* (Oak Processionary Moth). The new Plant Health Regulation ((EU) 2016/2031), which came into effect on the 14<sup>th</sup> December 2019, strengthened the requirements for Oak Processionary Moth. As part of the new plant health Regulations, plants for planting of *Quercus* L, other than *Quercus suber*, with a girth of at least 8cm measured at a height of 1.2m above the root collar must comply with at least one of the following requirements:

- a) the plants have been grown throughout their life in places of production in countries where *Thaumetopoea processionea* L. is not known to occur, or
- b) the plants have been grown throughout their life in an area free from *Thaumetopoea* processionea L. established by the National Plant Protection Organisation in accordance with relevant International Standards for Phytosanitary Measures, or
- c) the plants have been grown throughout their life in a site with complete physical protection against the introduction of *Thaumetopoea processionea* L. and have been inspected at appropriate times and found to be free from *Thaumetopoea processionea* L.

After exchanges with other EU Member States (MS), it is the Department of Agriculture, Food and Marine's (DAFM) understanding that other MS cannot meet the new criteria. Therefore, it is not possible to import *Quercus* with a girth of at least 8 cm measured at 1.2m above the root collar to Ireland. *Quercus* plants under 1.2m at the root collar and/or under 8cm girth can still be imported from other MS.

Furthermore a new Statutory Instrument (S.I. 30 of 2020) to prevent the introduction of Oak Processionary Moth into Ireland was put in place in Feb 2020. This Order requires any person bringing **all** sizes of *Quercus* plants or trees into the State to notify the Minister in writing at least two days in advance, giving the following particulars of each consignment:

- (a) the intended date of their landing into the State;
- (b) the intended destination;
- (c) the genus, species and quantity;
- (d) the identification number of the supplier of the plants;
- (e) the country from which they have been consigned.
