Mark Ferguson, SFI:

Covid-19 has accelerated the need for Digital, AI, and robotics. Israel is an example of grasping a major opportunity to move to higher level jobs. Reference to the Founder Forum where relevant stakeholders come together with investors, corporate and government leaders, to discuss the future of industries, new technologies and business models.

Phil O'Flaherty, DFHERIS:

Consultation on new Apprenticeship Plan underway. Deadline for submissions 18th September. Important in addressing key element of the programme for Government.

Andrew Brownlee, SOLAS:

All colleges will be open for business on a face to face basis by 29th September. General principal is to maximise onsite learning. €37m in funding will be used for people who have lost their jobs as a result of Covid. 14,000 places in 2020 and an additional 4,000 in 2021. Covid-19 is hitting apprenticeship programmes. Craft registrations are down 37% while registrations on new programmes are stable. Welcomed the new Apprenticeship Incentivisation Scheme where employers will receive a €2k up-front per apprentice and a further €1k after 12 months if apprentice is still on their books. There is a good response to the scheme -234 employers 286 apprenticeships. Constraints within IoTs could hinder the apprenticeship programmes. Addition funding has been allocated to further roll out the NZEB pilot project.

Paul Healy, Skillnet Ireland:

From 1st January 2021 custom declarations will be required. SI running a virtual course to complete customs forms. 3,000 business to avail of scheme. Since May the **ReBound initiative** has been very successful. 18 trade associations have come together. 3,200

	businesses and 6.000 trainees have participated. Welcomed the July stimulus package which has allowed businesses to reopen in a safe way. William Beausang, DFHERIS: The HEA has written to providers re targeted provision of key places included in the July stimulus package. Martin Mc Vicar, Combilift: Welcomed the July stimulus package however more investment is needed to help SMEs recruit apprenticeships. Would advocate for funding for off the job apprentices to incentivise SMEs. Phil O'Flaherty DFHERIS: Acknowledged that apprenticeship costs are a complex issue and that it is a strong theme in the submissions received as part of the consultation process. He gave reassurance that it is very much on the radar in the context of framing the new apprenticeship plan.
